

Wisdom and knowledge

"Knowledge is knowing that a tomato is a fruit; wisdom is not putting it in a fruit salad." That quotation is variously attributed - but I believe it originates with Miles Kington. As with any pearl of wisdom, the identity of the original author gradually matters less and less. What matters is that others learn a new perspective. The wit of Kington's quotation helps fix it in my mind — and I am a better person when I remember that wisdom surpasses mere knowledge. Wisdom is what we are being given, week by week, in the Midweek Pause to Pray videos.

Each week we are being offered a spiritual fruit salad — a mix of wise perspective, faithful praying, gentle Bible reading, and, now, the singing or saying of a psalm. Appropriately, the current series is based on the "fruits of the spirit" (Galatians 5). I treasure this list — love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control - not only because it simply and clearly names ways of godly living, but also because there is no hierarchy. Peace is not better than patience; generosity is not more fundamental than faithfulness. It's the sort of list that emphasises the need for fellow Christians. It is only a whole congregation that can be fully holy. Each perspective enriches another. Some of the spiritual power and effectiveness of the Midweek P2P videos is that a range of insights and voices is on offer.
