# Face to face



### Dear Friends,

John Magee was a pilot, serving in the Royal Canadian Air Force during the Second World War. Sadly he died in 1941, but not before he had written a powerful poem that needs to be heard today. After months of being locked down, we are all starting to appreciate that new horizons beckon, and new possibilities are opening up. We will each be deciding how and when we can make the most of the regulations easing. Here is the poem that captures the mood and memories of freedom and space:



Oh! I have slipped the surly bonds of Earth
And danced the skies on laughter-silvered wings;
Sunward I've climbed, and joined the tumbling mirth
Of sun-split clouds, — and done a hundred things
You have not dreamed of — wheeled and soared and swung
High in the sunlit silence.
Hov'ring there, I've chased the shouting wind along, and flung
My eager craft through footless halls of air...

Up, up the long, delirious burning blue I've topped the wind-swept heights with easy grace Where never lark, or ever eagle flew — And, while with silent, lifting mind I've trod The high untrespassed sanctity of space, Put out my hand, and touched the face of God.

As well as being moved by this poem, I want to name that I see the face of God in other ways as well – in the recognition of companions who have for the last 12 months been only visible on screen; in the surprise and delight of being face to face with a long-missed friend. At times, God comes to us, it is true, on the mountain top – or even beyond that, as described by Magee. God also comes to us in local, immediate, earthly ways: in casual conversation, face to face. Now, as I connect with someone in that way, my heart is stirred, and I feel the sanctity of human living.


# Worship update

Coffee rooms on Zoom are still open after the service. If you need help getting onto YouTube, please let us know and we'd be glad to talk you through it.




### Day by day

## A hideaway you should know about

Matrix Trust, a local youth work charity, has created something special in a little known corner of Guildford. Tucked away in the Allen House grounds (just off Eastgate Gardens), The Hideaway will be much more than a destination café, becoming a unique community hub connecting the skills and experience of local residents with

needs of local young people. During the day the café team will be enriched with young people working alongside our baristas and kitchen team as apprentices, gaining valuable on-the-job experience as part of the accredited national programme, alongside mentoring, a life skills programme and support to find future employment.

Once the school day ends, The Hideaway will closed to the public to be <u>transformed into a social space for young people</u> from across Guildford Borough; a safe space to make friends, build relational connections with youth workers and cultivate vital social and emotional skills. A much needed space currently lacking in Guildford town centre. We are open for takeaway coffee and cakes from Monday 12th April at 10am, or you can stay a while on the terrace (although you may need to wrap up warm!) Later in the Spring when we are allowed to open fully we will send a invitation to a special event, so do watch out for that. In the meantime we hope to see you at The Hideaway soon.





#### A new Rector for St Nicolas' Guildford

Fr Neil Roberts has been appointed as the next Rector of St. Nicolas' Guildford. His Induction and Collation will be held on Tuesday September 7.

Fr Neil went to Kings College London as a Choral Scholar and took degrees in theology. Following postgraduate study at Cambridge, where he was also a Lay Clerk at St Edmundsbury Cathedral, Fr Neil taught for sixteen years, first in Leicestershire, teaching RE and Music, and then here in Surrey where for ten years he was Head of Religion and Philosophy at Reigate Grammar School. It was here that he met his wife, Helen, a Surrey girl, and they started their family.

After discerning a call to the priesthood, Fr Neil trained at St Augustine's College and took his ministry degree from Kent and a research degree from Canterbury on the Spirituality of Music. He has served in parishes in Southwark and Chichester dioceses and is currently a School Chaplain in Derbyshire. It is from there that together with Helen, Louis, Benedict and Ted, their boys, come to Guildford. As well as being Chaplain he has been Head of Department, a member of the diocesan Board of Education, a Curate tutor on Leadership and Canon Law and he has also served as Assistant Cathedral Chaplain. He is a Priest Associate of the Holy House of Walsingham and an Oblate of the Order of St Benedict - his mother house being Alton Abbey.
