Eco Church

Holy Trinity Church, Guildford, has been granted a Gold Eco Church Award by A Rocha UK. We are now the 23rd Gold Awarded Eco Church in England and Wales. Well done to everyone involved in reaching this significant milestone! Our thanks go to David Uzzell for leading the work on this.

*The Holy Trinity Eco Group has been working hard since 2016, exploring the different ways in which we can reduce our environmental impact as well as making the spaces around the church attractive to wildlife and places of rest and contemplation in the centre of a bustling town. We are always looking for more people to join us and help create and promote a both more carbon-free church and community. Eco Church assesses progress, attitudes and achievements under 5 categories: Worship and Teaching, Buildings, Land, Community and Global Engagement and Lifestyle. When they visited us last month, they noted the work with young children and youth (who are often themselves leaders on Eco projects in their schools). They valued that, when major works have been done on our buildings, energy saving features have been incorporated whenever possible (though there is further to go – see below).

The work in the churchyards was praised, especially the thorough work auditing the birds, bees and flowers. They were glad to hear about the surveys that have been undertaken within our own congregations, noting that people have different motivations for taking the environment seriously.

The report from Eco Church said:

"Highlights: It's been great to see how green principles are integrated into the Church's DNA and that the 'Act Local and Think Global' is clearly evident in all that you seek to do to love and serve the local community. We understand that you are a church that is keen to not just celebrate God's creation on one

Sunday but throughout the year as a key part of your church community. Your aim of helping all people to understand what it means to be living in God's creation is so clear and especially how you can help them be change agents themselves.

It was so encouraging to hear more about how you work in collaboration with other groups in Guildford. It was wonderful to see that your role as the Eco Champion Church for Guildford Deanery is another way for you to shine brightly as a beacon for what other churches can do to care for creation.

We recognised the wealth of experience and knowledge your church Eco team often through the challenges you have worked through particularly on the buildings side.

It will be good to explore how your passion and care for the environment is evident as people walk through the doors of your church. We chatted about a visible log of all the nature you've seen in the church yard as just one example. We also suggested how the many different groups from the local community are made aware of the environmental policies as users and hirers of your church space. Perhaps this could be put into writing and form part of the hiring agreement."

A stage on the journey

Since the beginning of our engagement with Eco Church, we have wanted to encourage other churches to do what they can, in their locality and within their own context, to promote delight in God's creation and respect for our fragile environment. So, this award will, I trust, be an encouragement to others (as well as ourselves), especially as many small manageable steps are needed for a long journey.

At the time of assessment, we were totally up front about the difficulties we have been having with improving the windows in the Trinity Centre. The desire to install double glazing there has not gone away – working with the planning department of the Borough Council takes a long time. Also, we acknowledged that the oil boiler in Holy Trinity church will be replaced with much more environmentally friendly technology, when it reaches the end of its natural life. They acknowledged the challenges that we are facing as we care for this Grade 1 listed building, the efforts that we have been making, and the long journey that everyone is on as we move towards becoming carbon-neutral. So, there remain many practical things still to work on.

St Mary's makes its own contribution to this journey

A team has been established at St Mary's to work through the criteria for achieving an Eco Church award there led by Annika Matthews. The Eco Church programme was not able to assess both churches together. If you would like to assist with this at St Mary's, please [be in touch](#).

- Pray for Carolyn Graham and others on General Synod, as they seek to persuade and encourage national Church leaders.

- Spend an hour with a churchyard working party (at either church) as we look after "God's acre".
- Encourage young people in their determination and courageous action.

Keep safe

Our duty is to keep ourselves safe, and to do what we can to keep others safe too. Our approach, at worship and other events in the parish, has been to take responsibility wisely, to be sensitive to others, and to recognise that our behaviour will influence our neighbours (for good or ill). We have to balance hope and anxiety, freedom and responsibility, 'making the most of opportunities' with 'not overdoing things'. So I want to remind us that wearing masks is a way of signalling your care for others, as well as protecting ourselves. Hearing you sing hymns in church has been such a boost to my spirits – so has staying well. Being able to share coffee after worship is an expression of friendliness that has been much missed – and we do this carefully.

Worship

On Remembrance Sunday 14th November, we will be welcoming many who do not regularly worship in our churches. I have no control over how many may attend (though we are expecting smaller congregations). Remember that half the service happens at the Castle Grounds (from about 10.30am, after a start at HT at 9.45am); and that there is an Evening Eucharist at 6pm.


Remembrance Service • Charlottesville War Memorial Saturday 13th November at 3pm

Located in Springs, 30 miles from Johannesburg in South Africa, the school now provides pre-school and primary education for 356 children. The majority of students are from the poorest environment of the nearby informal settlement of Daggafontein.
