Lend me your ears



Dear Friends,

Friends, Romans, countrymen These are the stirring words that open Marc Anthony's funeral eulogy for Julius Caesar (according to Shakespeare). As a child, I giggled over the next phrase: 'lend me your ears'. But I was annoyed by the following sentence, believing that it should not be true: The evil that men do lives after them; The good is oft interred with their bones.

Later I learnt that, throughout his speech, Marc Anthony was stirring up the crowd, saying the exact opposite of what he really meant. Of course, he was really trying to win



the crowd over by praising Caesar's good deeds – but had to pretend that his purpose was the opposite. Beware the slippery words of politicians! But now, I see we have a choice.

As we reflect on the life of a public figure, we can choose whether to allow their 'evil to live after them', or whether to keep in mind the good. As a young priest, when preparing a funeral address, I thought I had to speak the whole truth about the person who had died. But now I am less sure that that is right. In a eulogy, I would never want to pretend, nor would I want to paint someone to be an unblemished saint. But, in most circumstances, I find that it is right to remind people of the good done, the kindness showed, and the struggles overcome. For example, with Prince Philip, there are familiar tales of his gaffes and unintended insults. We can choose to recall those, allowing the tale of those unfortunate moments to live on. Or we can choose to remember loyalty, courage, creativity, service and honour.

At Caesar's funeral, Marc Anthony has power over the crowd (according to Shakespeare) because they are gullible, following the rhetoric of a crowd-pleaser. What is missing is a description of the choices each and every member of the crowd makes — to choose whether to lend their ears. Similarly now with Prince Philip — similarly, on a day to day basis, with much of what is written on social media: a platform that begs you to "lend your ears" so that all types of anger, hatred and mistrust can be poured in.

Your choice! My default choice is to allow "the good that people do should live after them".


Shortly before the funeral on Saturday, the bells from Holy Trinity and St Mary's will be tolled, as a signal of respect. You will be familiar with the lines from the poem by John Donne, which bind us together as people seeking to 'do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with God':

Therefore, send not to know For whom the bell tolls, It tolls for thee.

Worship in church

You are welcome to come in person to any of our services (no need to book) or join us on YouTube (HT) or on Zoom (SM). If you come to church:

- The chairs are spaced two metres apart, but you can sit with people in your family/bubble.
- Everyone wears masks, except for those who are exempt, the choir when singing and the clergy while leading worship. For now, only the choir is permitted to sing.
- We bring Communion to you so that you don't have to move around the church.
- We keep the doors open for improved ventilation, so please wrap up warmly!
- We're not serving coffee after services, so we ask that you leave the church promptly and to avoid mingling. You are welcome to chat in the churchyard or to nip home to join a Zoom coffee room.
- Service sheets and hymn books are quarantined each week.
- We ask people to maintain social distancing to avoid crowding around the doors.

One normal part of public worship that is currently impossible (under current regulations) is the taking of a collection. You have been generous in your support of the parish.


Trinity Club@Home
