Dear Friends,

Change that is possible

"I wear a white ribbon today, because men need to change and because in Christ I see what that change could be." So said the Archbishop of York in a <u>sermon earlier this month</u>, at a service remembering all victims of Domestic Abuse. Even though there are many dates in the calendar clamouring for our attention, this is worthy of respect. I feel drawn this year in particular to honour the work of those involved as there was a powerful seminar, hosted in Holy Trinity in October, when we heard from victims, police, magistrates and social workers. The courage that is required to bring peace into places of violence and such deep emotions, is only matched by the courage of the women who seek to flee. Violence traps everyone, but the pain is inflicted, in the vast majority of cases, on women. Being aware of these situations, being prepared to talk about the subject, being ready to show your support – all help in small ways to change what we understand as acceptable behaviour. Much fine work is happening on this subject in schools now. Churches need to follow suit.

The White Ribbon Campaign began as a response to a tragic day when 14 women were murdered in 1989 by someone who was driven by his hatred of women. From that tragedy has sprung a worldwide movement. I am reminded of these words, written by Tertullian, a Christian author, in about 200 AD: "The blood of martyrs is the seed bed of the Church". He was writing about unfair treatment of Christians by both the Roman authorities and those who stood idly by, noticing but doing nothing. Violent treatment was handed out to Christians, often on the basis of assumptions and rumours. Tertullian was urging the culture to change, not out of self-protection, but rather because we are less mature when we merely allow our passions to control us. We dehumanize ourselves when we inflict pain on others. So, I agree with the archbishop – men need to change, and in Christ, I see that change is possible and find the grace and forgiveness to make that journey.

Decorating the tree


