## **PUBLIC WORSHIP SUSPENDED**

Due to the Coronavirus Covid-19 outbreak and following the advice of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, public worship at Holy Trinity and St Mary's is suspended until further notice.

The advice also states that churches should be open where possible. We are seeking to keep Holy Trinity open for prayer or a few moments of quiet as a sign of peace, confidence and hope for the town. **Point to ponder:** 'We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul' (Hebrews 6.19). Some of you will know the old Sunday School song: 'Will your anchor hold in the storms of life?' It has an uplifting tune, and a strong message - that, when storms come our way, we need to be well anchored, with God and each other. When the strands of care, hope and prayer are woven together, there is nothing that will uproot us from God's love. So, although we may not be able to touch each other in a literal way for now, we are still held - anchored - as we hear and speak words of care, hope and prayer.

When faced with unexpected challenges, it is easy to be frightened and confused. That's why, sadly, there is so much panic buying. But we are resourceful people, and we belong to a community that has many resources. Make use of these - which will be good for you, and also give you something to resource others.

We will continue to post Pause to pray content on our parish website, Facebook page and Twitter account. Use this - perhaps light a candle before you do so, and direct others to this resource. Within 24 hours of posting the first one, we received over 100 views and many favourable comments. Also, we will be finding other ways of keeping us together in spirit, including some offerings from our musicians.

**Point to ponder:** I am sure many will be feeling unprepared to face this current situation. So, consider what happened to David (see 1 Samuel 17). When he was called to fight Goliath, he was told by God to use the skills he already had. He did not need extra armour, nor the weapons that others had been using. God had already been preparing him for this moment, without David even recognising it. You too - your life of faith (whether it has been for 8 or 80 years) has been the best preparation for what is needed now. You know how to pray, to care, to be calm and still, to live with uncertainty, and to display hope. This is the time to draw on what is already there. Your character of kindness and faith may be precisely what others need now.
