



Dear Friends,

I cried. I don't usually cry, even in tear-jerking movies (apart from *The Railway Children*, which always reduces me to tears). But this summer I unashamedly cried while reading *Hamnet* by Maggie O'Farrell. I had to put the book down at times, because I was so moved. If I were now teaching at a theological college, I would recommend this novel as a brilliant, insightful description of the pain and bewilderment of bereavement.

When I was training as a priest, the recommended equivalent was **A Grief Observed** by CS Lewis. But this is just as evocative. Don't worry - it is not a sad novel; but it is very moving: poignant, perceptive, hopeful, realistic. What's more, the novel is based on a fantastic description of how deeply people can understand each other and take delight in their peculiar characteristics. Husband and wife, mother and son, siblings and friends - in many different ways, the novel shows how we are enriched through close relationships when we experience acceptance, not only for who we are but also for who we are becoming. In that way, the tragedy of the novel is located in a framework of love, joy, honesty and trust.

This is not a simple historical novel though it is based on the true story of Shakespeare, his wife and their son who died early. Ironically, I finished the book with a similar feeling that I

have at the end of a Shakespeare play: that I have been enabled to look deeply into the human soul; I have understood more of what it is like to be tempted, travailed, and provoked by pride or lust; and that, in drawing closer to others, I am readier to face the challenges of living well myself.
