Associate Minister, Ben Cahill-Nicholls writes:

Advent: a time of bustle and busyness, that gives way to delicious delight.

Leslie Bricusse, who died recently, was a hugely talented composer and lyricist. Although his 1967 film of Doctor Dolittle was a box-office flop, its songs are witty, charming, and beautifully constructed. At one point, its heroine Emma Fairfax sings a ballad called 'Waiting'. The music shifts in tone – with broad, lush chords giving way to frantic, escalating quavers – as she travels through a range of emotions: impatience, frustration, excitement, hope, fear, confusion.

Emma is waiting not for Christmas, but for Dr Dolittle to realize he loves her. But the song's lyrics, with their repeated call 'waiting! waiting!', make me think of Advent. At its heart, Advent is a period of waiting, and with all the range of emotion that any period of anticipation brings. We know what's just around the corner: the promise not just of presents and music and food, but of the birth of Our Lord, and all that means for our faith and our world. That can make us impatient (yes, adults too) and frustrated, but excited and hopeful as well. And, because Christmas can be a challenging time of year for many, we may experience fear and confusion too.

How are we to handle these clashing concerns? Firstly, the joy of Advent is precisely the joy of knowing what is to come – of focusing on the end-goal. If our hearts and minds remain fixed on Jesus Christ, on everything that he offers and everything that he does and everything that he is, the period of waiting suddenly has purpose, intent, and energy. Secondly, of course, we can enjoy the space and time that a waiting-room provides. To use a simple example: There was a time when I used to hate sitting outside the dentist's door, preparing once again to be told that I'm not very good at brushing, and with only out-of-date magazines for company. As my life has become busier, and the world around me noisier, I have come to cherish those times: an opportunity for silence, for stillness, for reflection, for respite. Advent can offer those, if we allow it to. It can be a time of careful preparation, of prayerful calm.

Christmas can be a tough time for a lot of people, and the weeks leading up to it will bring tests and turbulence. There's one more thing, though, that this time has in common with Emma Fairfax as she sat on that remote beach, combing her hair after the storm. That thing is love. Whatever Christmas and Advent mean for us all, they are, at their heart, a time of love – the time, moreover, that love came to us in our own form and likeness and, in doing so, showed us how to love. And so, amidst the bustle and busyness of Advent, amongst the range of emotions it will bring, perhaps we can focus ourselves on that: on the love which, more than anything else, is what the birth of Jesus Christ is truly about. How delicious, how delightful, how divine, that we get to wait for that!
