'In only one kind'

Since the Reformation, the Church of England, in its Thirty-nine Articles, has taught that the faithful should receive both the bread and the wine at Holy Communion. Up until this point the faithful would attend the Mass and hear the prayers spoken by the priest, but would not receive Communion more than about once a year and even then, they would only receive the bread.

In Roman Catholic churches across the world, many people continue to take only the bread at Communion, although the chalice is sometimes offered to them as well. I remember being struck by this when first going to church in Italy where the chalice was not offered to us. At first this was alien to me, but, after a while, I came to understand that I was not receiving any less by this practice.

Although the CofE teaches that we should all partake in Christ's body and blood, the rubrics of the Eucharist instruct the priest that there are valid reasons why we may only receive 'in only one kind', that is, either the bread or the wine. Moreover, we are assured that that by doing so, we are still receiving the full body and blood of Christ.

By withdrawing the chalice from Eucharistic worship in the current climate of Coronavirus, the Church of England is not making any change to its theology, rather it is seeking to safeguard those in our congregations who are more susceptible to viral infections. Given that generosity along with sacrifice is at the heart of the Eucharist, by receiving in only one kind, we visibly show our love and care for one another.

On Tuesday the Parochial Church Council discussed and agreed the following items:

- That Holy Trinity will be the central church for the Order of St George in Surrey, a charitable body working world-wide, for an initial five years, involving perhaps one service a year.
- Eco Church: a report of a meeting after church in February, looking at what could/should be done to honour God's creation, and acknowledging different responses.
- The accounts for 2019 were explained and delegated for final approval by a small group before the Annual Meeting. The auditors so far are happy with the accounts.
- The parish has undertaken a 'Past Case Review' for the Bishop, and found no evidence of cases of abuse that have been badly handled in the past. The Rector now serves on a diocesan group handling this.
- Careful discussion continues on the new sound system, including a console fixed at the back of the nave, which will give greater flexibility, with more speakers in the church, vestries and hall, improving the sound generally. In addition, it will be possible to amplify voices outside the church, such as on Good Friday or Armed Forces Day.
- Discussions continue about the 15+ age group, perhaps in conjunction with youth work by the Matrix Trust in Allen House pavilion.
