Ringing bells

You may have noticed the news story about churches being asked to ring their bells on January 31st to celebrate this country leaving the EU, and wondered what will happen here.

Routinely, I receive comments about how much people appreciate hearing the bells in our two towers (St Mary's and Holy Trinity). The sound is comforting, traditional, British; it evokes a sense of belonging – a sound that is local for the local community. Yet the sound of bells is also clearly a public matter (and very occasionally I receive complaints, chiefly from those who are unused to the sound of bells, or who are surprised to hear them in the centre of town). The chief purpose of church bells is to alert the community to the worship of God. In part, bells call people to worship – but in part also, bells tell people worship is happening, whether they attend or not. Bells signal that prayer is happening, in and for the community, whether people believe, participate or simply continue with their daily work. Because bells are a public signal, they are occasionally used for significant local or national events: major moments of celebration or distress, the start of a New Year, funerals and Remembrance Sunday. Yet these are not merely secular moments, for in each case the church offers prayers, whether in support of those in trouble or in celebration. For example, I am sure that the bells will ring some time during the weekend of the 75th anniversary of VE day.

I consider that ringing the bells to mark the "start of Brexit" would be an inappropriate way to mark such a contentious, divisive political act. I know some will want to celebrate on this day, and others will be deeply distressed. It would be wrong for the church to do anything that could be so easily misunderstood. This decision is mine – and I have the support of Michael Bryant, Captain of our band of Bell Ringers.

On a lighter note, there has been a large amount of work done on the bells and the tower at St Mary's in the last 9 months. This is now complete. As soon as the other building works at St Mary's is finished, we will be arranging a day so that you — and all our neighbours in the town — can admire and enjoy the bells, visiting the tower (though that takes some physical agility). The bells are a public tool for the worship of God. We are very fortunate to have two fine towers and, more importantly, a dedicated band of ringers.
