




Dear Friends,

What a joy it was to be ordained priest last Saturday in Holy Trinity and to celebrate the Eucharist for the first time on Sunday with so many of you.

It has certainly been an unusual first year in ministry, but I have loved working in this parish and getting to know you all. This made last weekend all the more special for me. You've heard me say before that there can be no ordained deacons and priests without a community to serve and so, for me, being ordained in one of our churches and knowing that so many of you were watching online was really poignant. It felt like a parish celebration and I give thanks for you and all that we are here.

I would also like to repeat my thanks to those who helped put the service together — our musicians, churchwardens, tech team and flower arrangers did a fantastic job and I have had many messages from across the UK and Europe saying how wonderful the services were. Finally, thank you for the beautiful stole — I shall treasure and delight in wearing it for services.

If you were in Holy Trinity on Sunday, you may have picked up one the little cards showing this picture of Saint Thomas putting his hand in Jesus' side after the resurrection. (If you didn't get one, there are plenty left at the back of Holy Trinity.) I chose this image for two reasons. First, Thomas is 'my saint' and I have often found myself identifying with his 'I won't believe it until I see it'. I guess there is a bit in all of us like that. It's probably even more true when there is so much uncertainty in the world that we want tangible things to hang onto.



Secondly, when Thomas puts his hand in Jesus' wounds, he exclaims 'My Lord and my God'. This is said to be the first Christian creed as he recognises the resurrected Christ as the Son of God. To him the mystery is unveiled, but Jesus says, 'blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed'. That's you and me. St. Thomas teaches me to rejoice in the great mystery of faith — indeed on Sunday mornings at the Eucharist we proclaim our own Thomas-esque creed when we proclaim 'Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again!'.

Thomas was able to look into Jesus' eyes as he said these words; we look at the face of Christ in one another. That's the final reason I chose this picture. We are called to look for the Christ in our midst, in friend and stranger, to recognise and welcome Him. It's a fundamental part of the priestly ministry in which we all share and in which we are to encourage one another. In this parish, we are Christ's body, we are His hands, His mouth, His feet – and I look forward to being part of it all in the coming years of my ministry here among you.

Keeping in touch

Please help us keep in touch with you, and those with whom you are close. As the season turns, and as the health of the nation feels precarious, it will be very good if we can continue to offer words of support and encouragement – and also offer practical help where needed. Test and Trace

This parish fully supports all measures that are effective in reducing the levels of infection, and help us protect each other. Test and Trace QR codes are now on display. These are specific to each church and the Trinity Centre. Church of England guidance makes it clear that we have to display such posters, but we are not required to collect data (in a way that you may be experiencing in other hospitality venues). Some visitors and worshippers are giving us their contact details each week. This information is stored safely and disposed of securely after 21 days. We are working out what else we can do, not only to make us Covid-compliant, but also to make our churches as safe for everyone as possible.
